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What are Opioids?


- > Pain killers mainly
 - Hydromorphone Dilaudid aka Dillys
 - Morphine
 - Codeine
- Most famous street opioid is HEROIN!
 - Called "down or H or H-train" on the street
 - No longer in Ottawa
- Now all FENTANYL and analogs
 - Used mainly in surgery to put you to sleep
 - Now the street supply is manufactured locally no longer imported



What is an opiate overdose?

- > Opioids are substances that act on opioid receptors to produce morphine-like effects. Opioids are most often used medically to relieve pain
- > Opiate overdoses
 - mu receptors in brain and spinal cord saturated by opioid → depressed breathing → hypoxia → brain death
 - 3-5 mins to die!!!

The Opioid Problem is Getting Worse!



a Includes deaths related to all illicit drugs including, but not limited to, opioids.

b Includes deaths with completed investigations only.

c Includes deaths related to all illicit drugs including, but not limited to, opioids, from July to December only. This number is expected to rise.

The Opioid Problem is Getting Worse!

- > 4000 Canadians lost there lives in 2017
 - Increase of 34% over 2016
- Accidental overdoses deaths caused by fentanyl increased by 81% in 2017
- > 17 Canadians per day were hospitalized for opioid poisoning
 - Increase of 16% over 2016
- > Opioid dispensing by pharmacies DECREASED by 10% over 2016
 - Now more street use



What are the signs?

Physical signs

- $\rightarrow \downarrow$ level of consciousness
- > Pinpoint pupils "Pinnies"
- Deep snorting or gurgling sounds
- > Blue lips or fingernails
- > Limp body
- > Vomiting
- Shaking neurological response -"Funky chicken"

Vital signs

- > \downarrow respiratory rate
- > \downarrow heart rate
- > \downarrow blood pressure
- > \downarrow O2 saturation



Risk Factors for Opioid Overdose

> Patient factors

- Loss of tolerance / no tolerance (cocaine vs fentanyl)
- Other medical problems—asthma
- Previous overdose any substance
- Using alone
- > Drug factors
 - <u>Potency</u> drug are stronger than ever
 - <u>Contaminants</u> cant trust your drug dealer
 - <u>Routes of administration</u> vaping, injecting, chem sex
 - Polysubstance use drinking with drugs







What is Naloxone?

- > Brand name is Narcan (Narcan Kit)
- > Opiate antagonist
 - Does not clear the drug, it temporarily replaces the drug at the receptor site
- > Reverses the effects of opiate overdose
- > 4mg nasal spray
- > Takes ~2-4 minutes to work



Nasal Naloxone

- Higher amounts of naloxone available for bloodstream and lasts longer as compared to injectable
 - More risk of side effects as compared to injectable
- > One spray per dose given every 3 mins in alternating nostrils
- > People don't have to be breathing well for it to work!





Is it safe?



- Will have NO effect on someone who has not taken opiate drugs
- Only contraindicated in people with allergy to Naloxone
- > Pregnancy is NOT a contraindication



Effects of Naloxone

- Naloxone can cause mild to severe withdrawal symptoms in opiate dependent users
 - Agitation
- Sweating

– Nausea

- Anxiety
- Muscle aches Vomiting
- Pain



- > Duration of effect ~ 1 hour
 - Strong opioids last longer so clients may slip back into OD
 - Call 911-Always go to hospital



Procedure

- 1. Assess (shake and shout)
- 2. You <u>MUST</u> Call 911
- 3. Naloxone (Nasal or Injectable)
- 4. Chest compressions
- 5. Is it working
 - 1. No Naloxone again (3-5 mins later)
 - 2. Yes continue chest compressions and wait for EMS

Getting Naloxone

- > Free for everyone from Ontario pharmacies
 - ID no longer required but preferred

Criteria

- Currently using an opioid
 - Street or prescription
- Past user of opioids at risk for returning to use
- A family member or friend of someone at risk of opioid overdose
- > Initial kits vs replacement kits
 - Can get one or two kits
 - Injectable and nasal spray both available for free
- > Schedule II
 - Over the counter, not self selection



Naloxone : Why Pharmacy?

- > Ideal point of access
- > 56.1% who died of overdose filled a prescription for opioids in that month
- > Quick training no appointment or planning
- > We have supplies and training maybe uggghhh!
